Correspondence and communication in school

We now have a full school with 420 fantastic pupils! It is lovely to see it so full and vibrant. As headteacher, I love talking to parents and having conversations with them. Parental feedback is incredibly important to us whether positive or areas you feel we can improve on. However, as we have now grown to a larger than average school, we need to put in official communication methods for parents regarding who to contact if they have a query or complaint. I often receive in excess of a 500 emails a day and keeping on top of them is challenging. Sometimes I get emails regarding lost property or holiday requests etc which should be directed to the school office. Also, we have different layers of leadership at school who are there to support parents and families. 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Mighty Metals in Y3

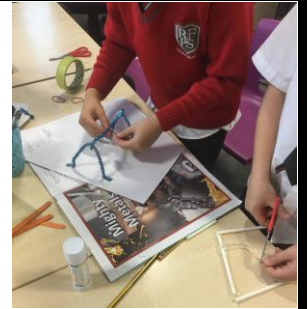
Year 3 kick started their Mighty Metals topic this week with a visit to the local playground.

Back in the classroom, the children received an important letter asking them to design, make and evaluate their very own playground apparatus.

The children created some excellent prototypes and wowed us with their enthusiasm and knowledge.

Parking and Road safety

Our school is at full capacity with 420 children. It is busier than ever on the roads around school because there are more people dropping their children off and picking them up. Lots of parents who live locally, walk to school which is great. However, lots of parents chose to send their child to a school further from their house meaning they have to drive. We are really happy that you have chosen RFPS but with that is the added complication of lots of cars and not many parking spaces. This is the exact same problem that every school has around the country. Parents should not be parking on double yellow lines and in neighbouring business car parks. It may mean you have to park further away and walk your child the rest of the way. This is a much safer for everyone concerned. Also, please do be careful when turning your car around in roads, especially Bailey rd, as there are hundreds of children and parents on the pavements and we have witnessed several near misses where a car has accidentally mounted the pavement. The police are going to be showing their presence at school drop off times more as they have had many incidents and illegal parking/driving reported to them. School staff are not responsible for finding you a car parking space or ensure that parents park legally. Please, let's work together to keep our community safe. **Kids and cars don't mix!**
